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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS APPLICABLE TO EACH MAJOR PROGRAM AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH OMB CIRCULAR A-133 AND ON THE SUPPLEMENTARY SCHEDULES OF EXPENDITURES OF FEDERAL AWARDS

Compliance

We have audited the compliance of the State of South Carolina (the State) with the types of compliance requirements described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2007. The State's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to each of its major federal programs is the responsibility of the State's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the State's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the State's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of the State's compliance with those requirements.

In our opinion, the State of South Carolina complied, in all material respects, with the requirements referred to in the preceding paragraph that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2007. However, the results of our auditing procedures disclosed instances of noncompliance with those requirements, which are required to be reported in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items 07E28-2, 07E28-3, 07F03-1 through 07F03-4, 07H63-1 through 07H63-4, 07H73-1 through 07H73-3, 07J02-1, 07J02-4, 07J04-1, 07J20-1, 07K05-1, 07K05-2, 07L04-2, 07L04-3, 07N04-1, 07P16-2, 07P24-2, and 07P24-3.

Internal Control Over Compliance

The management of the State of South Carolina is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to federal programs. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the State's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the State's internal control over compliance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in the State's internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses as defined below. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A control deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the State's ability to administer a federal program such that there is more than a remote likelihood that noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the State's internal control. We consider the deficiencies in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as findings 07E24-1, 07E28-1 through 07E28-3, 07F03-1 through 07F03-4, 07H63-1 through 07H63-4, 07H73-1 through 07H73-3, 07J02-1 through 07J02-4, 07J04-1, 07J20-1, 07K05-1, 07K05-2, 07L04-1 through 07L04-3, 07N04-1, 07N04-2, 07P16-1, 07P16-2, and 07P24-1 through 07P24-3 to be significant deficiencies.

A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented or detected by the State's internal control. Of the significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, we consider findings 07F03-1, 07F03-2, 07H73-1, 07H73-2, 07J02-2, 07J02-4, and 07L04-1 through 07L04-3 to be material weaknesses.

The State's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. We did not audit the State's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

Schedules of Expenditures of Federal Awards

We have jointly audited, with Clifton Gunderson, LLP, the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, the aggregate discretely presented component units, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the State of South Carolina as of and for the year ended June 30, 2007, and have issued our report thereon dated November 15, 2007. Our audit was performed for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the State's basic financial statements. The accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards, dated November 15, 2007, are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by OMB Circular A-133 and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

The State's basic financial statements included the operations of certain agencies and component units that have been excluded from the schedules of expenditures of federal awards because each of the entities engaged other auditors to perform an audit in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996. As described in Note 1, these agencies and component units expended \$1,731,866,973 in federal awards during the year ended June 30, 2007.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Governor and Members of the General Assembly, the governing body and management of State agencies, the cognizant federal agency, federal awarding agencies, and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

Entity (Continued)

Accordingly, the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards present the federal financial assistance programs administered by the State, as defined on the previous page, for the year ended June 30, 2007.

Non-Cash Federal Programs

The State is the recipient of federal financial assistance programs that do not result in cash receipts or disbursements, termed "non-cash programs". The distributions under these programs are included in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards.

Loan Programs

The amounts reported in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards for the loan programs listed below represent federal capital contributions and administrative costs incurred during the year ended June 30, 2007. All programs/clusters that had either loans outstanding or total expenditures (including administrative expenses) in excess of \$16,384,613 were determined to be Type A programs and were subjected to a risk assessment process for the selection of major programs to be tested.

State Revolving Fund (CFDA 66.458) - The primary objective of the State Revolving Fund (SRF) is to provide financial assistance (not grants) for constructing municipal treatment works and for developing and implementing nonpoint source management programs and estuary management plans.

Safe Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (CFDA 66.468) - This program, initiated in fiscal year 1997-98, is funded by the EPA and State matching funds. The primary objective of the program is to provide communities with affordable financing in the form of long-term, low-interest loans for the construction of public drinking water facilities. The South Carolina Budget and Control Board - Office of Local Government division is responsible for the State-level management and financial administration of this revolving loan program.

ConserFund Revolving Loan Fund - This fund was set up using Petroleum Violation Escrow (PVE) funds (CFDA 81.502) by the South Carolina Budget and Control Board - State Energy Office. The fund was established to provide loans to State agencies, school districts, local governments and nonprofit corporations for energy efficiency improvements.

EnerFund Revolving Loan Fund - This fund was set up using Petroleum Violation Escrow (PVE) funds (CFDA 81.502) by the South Carolina Budget and Control Board - State Energy Office. The fund was established to provide loans to commercial and industrial facilities and for recycling development projects for energy efficiency improvements. No new loans were made during Fiscal Year 2007 for this fund and it had no balance at June 30, 2007.

Other Federal Assistance

The "Other Federal Assistance" presented in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards consists of federal financial assistance programs that have not been assigned CFDA numbers. The detail of grants without CFDA numbers is presented in Schedule 2 by State agency.

Pass-Through Expenditures

Federal funds received by one State grantee agency and redistributed (expended) to another State grantee agency (i.e., a pass-through of funds by the primary recipient State grantee agency to a subrecipient State grantee agency), are reported in Schedule 1 as federal expenditures of the primary receiving/expending State grantee agency. This is to avoid duplication and the overstatement of the aggregate level of federal financial assistance expended by the State.

The pass-through funds are included in both the primary recipient and subrecipient State grantee agencies in Schedule 2, the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards by State Agency. The pass-through funds are separately identified in Schedule 2 to provide a complete schedule of all federal funds administered by State agencies within the single audit entity during the year ended June 30, 2007.

When a State agency receives funds as a subrecipient from outside the single audit entity, these funds are included in both Schedules 1 and 2. These funds are included as a part of "Total Passed Through Entities Not Included in Reporting Entity" in Schedule 2.

NOTE 2 - BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The expenditures presented in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards were developed from agency records which reconcile to the Statewide Accounting and Reporting System (STARS). STARS is the State's budgetary basis accounting system which serves as a primary source of information in the preparation of the State's financial statements. The STARS basis of accounting for the expenditures presented is the cash basis with the following exceptions:

- (1) Departments and agencies charge certain vendor and interfund payments against the preceding fiscal year's appropriations through July 18.
- (2) Certain non-cash activity, such as food stamp benefits is recorded as an expenditure in the fiscal year in which the resources are distributed to the beneficiaries.

Federal revenues and expenditures are included primarily in the governmental funds in the State's financial statements.

NOTE 3 - MATCHING COST

Matching costs, i.e. the non-federal share of certain program costs, are included in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards when the federal and state portions of costs are combined and the state portion cannot be separately identified.

NOTE 4 - PETROLEUM OVERCHARGE RECOVERIES

In the current and prior years the State received monies relating to recoveries from petroleum companies which had overcharged customers when price controls were in effect. These monies are expended under specific federal programs in accordance with the federal laws and regulations pertaining to such programs. Accordingly, these amounts are included in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards under the specific federal program to which they relate.

NOTE 5 - RELATIONSHIP TO FEDERAL FINANCIAL REPORTS

The regulations and guidelines governing the preparation of federal financial reports vary by federal agency and among programs administered by the same agency. Accordingly, the amounts reported in the federal financial reports do not necessarily agree with the amounts reported in the accompanying schedules of expenditures of federal awards which are prepared on the basis explained in Notes 1 and 2. The federal financial reports have been reconciled to amounts included in the schedules of expenditures for all major programs.

NOTE 6 - WIC REBATES

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007 the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control received cash rebates from infant formula manufacturers in the amount of \$30,712,830 on sales of formula to participants in the WIC program (CFDA 10.557). Rebate contracts with infant formula manufacturers are authorized by 7 CFR 246.16a as a cost containment measure. Rebates represent a reduction of expenditures previously incurred for WIC food benefit costs. Applying the rebates received to such costs enabled the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control to extend program benefits to 474,403 more persons than could have been served this fiscal year in the absence of the rebate contract.

Agencies are required to submit a Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA) to the Office of the State Auditor. The SFFA is used to prepare the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards. We noted several errors during our testing of the agency prepared SFFA:

1. The SFFA contained numerous incorrect grant titles, grant numbers and fund source codes.
2. One grant was reported with an incorrect CFDA number.
3. Several beginning fund balance amounts did not agree to 2006 SFFA ending balances.
4. The SFFA contained numerous misstatements of receipt, expenditure, and ending fund balance amounts.
5. A schedule of federal funds passed through to subrecipients was not submitted.

The SFFA was revised to correct the errors described above.

It appears personnel assigned to prepare the SFFA did not fully understand the requirements for preparing the SFFA as outlined in the Office of the State Auditor Letter of Instruction. Further, Adjutant General personnel performed no detailed review of the SFFA or reconciliation of the SFFA to Adjutant General or Comptroller General's accounting records to ensure accuracy and completeness prior to submission to the Office of the State Auditor.

To determine if the Commission had addressed the deficiencies noted in the prior year finding we reviewed the Commission's fiscal year 2007 SFFA. Based on our review we noted the following:

1. CFDA No. 93.617 - Receipts were overstated by \$91,157 and expenditures were overstated by \$91,157.
2. CFDA No. 90.401 - Other additions were understated by \$6,688.
3. CFDA No. 39.011 - Other deductions were understated by \$6,688.

The Office of the State Auditor Letter of Instruction provides agencies with guidance and instructions on how to prepare the SFFA. During our fiscal year 2006 follow up to the finding originally reported in the fiscal year 2005 Single Audit, we reported the following:

To correct the under match in fiscal year 2005, the Commission moved \$258,922 of federal expenditures paid in fiscal year 2006 to its match account. A report prepared by the U.S. Election Assistance Commission - Office of the Inspector General (OIG) dated September 13, 2006 disclosed the Commission had incorrectly determined the match requirement in fiscal year 2005 and still had an under match of \$85,319. The Commission originally calculated the State match by multiplying five percent by the \$32,421,280 total grant funds which resulted in a state match of \$1,621,064. The correct calculation should have been to divide the total grant amount by 95 percent and then subtract the grant award from that total which would result in a match of \$1,706,383. The Inspector General's Office further noted that the Commission did not deposit the amount it had appropriated for the match into the State Election Fund to earn interest, which resulted in an estimated \$29,475 of lost interest.

We recommend, in accordance with the OIG recommendation, that the State Election Commission deposit State funds of \$114,794 (\$85,319 under match plus interest of \$29,475) into the State Election Fund restricted account.

During our fiscal year 2007 follow-up to this finding, we noted the Commission had asked for guidance from both the South Carolina State Treasurer's Office and the U.S. Election Assistance Commission regarding how to proceed with implementing the OIG recommendation. According to Commission personnel and our review of correspondence between the Commission and these agencies we noted the U.S. Election Assistance Commission has agreed with the OIG recommendation that the Commission deposit the \$114,794 into the State Election Fund restricted account. However, the State Treasurer's Office does not agree with the OIG's finding and does not agree that the state match should accrue interest because matching funds are not "deposited" into the State Election Fund. Further, the State Treasurer's Office believes that the transfer of appropriations to an interest bearing account would be unconstitutional since interest earned on these funds would in essence create appropriations which can only be created by the state legislature.

The Commission met with representatives of the State Treasurer's Office in November 2007 to determine how this issue could be resolved. During this meeting it was recommended that the Commission contact the State Budget Office for assistance in drafting legislation to resolve this issue. The Commission contacted the State Budget Office and based on their conversations it appears that this finding can be resolved without legislation.

Section 253 (b) (5) of the Help America Vote Act requires as a condition to receiving requirements payments that:

. . . appropriated funds for carrying out the activities for which the requirements payment is made in an amount equal to five percent of the total amount to be spent for such activities (taking into account the requirements payments and the amount spent by the State) . . .

Section 254 (b)(1) of the Help America Vote Act also requires states to deposit the funds appropriated to match the requirements payments into a state election fund described as follows:

- (A) Amounts appropriated or otherwise made available by the State for carrying out the activities for which the requirements payment is made to the State under this part.

Also, the Commission did not (1) submit an amended federal fiscal year 2004 SF-269 report to correct errors for the Help America Vote Act Requirements Payment grant (CFDA No. 90.401), (2) did not attempt to contact the federal grantor regarding reporting requirements to ensure reports were prepared in accordance with federal guidelines, and (3) did not make any changes to its policies and procedures regarding reporting as recommended.

In addition, we recommend that the Commission meet with the federal grantor to identify the reporting requirements applicable to its federal grants and develop and implement procedures to ensure accurate reporting of information to the federal grantor. The procedures should identify specific steps to be followed by the preparer and require an independent review to ensure the timely detection and correction of errors.

During this engagement, we made inquiries of Commission personnel to determine if corrective action had been taken. We were told that the Commission has been in contact with the federal grantor; however, the Commission has not resolved the reporting issues or submitted amended reports. Commission personnel stated they do not intend to submit amended reports until the reporting issues are resolved.

Good internal controls require that reports include accurate information and be prepared in conformity with instructions.

We recommend that the Commission continue efforts to resolve reporting issues in order to amend reports. Further, we recommend that the Commission implement policies and procedures to ensure accurate reporting of information to the federal grantor. The procedures should identify specific steps to be followed by the preparer and require an independent review to ensure the timely detection and correction of errors.

The South Carolina Budget and Control Board's (the Board) State Surplus Property Office (SSPO) does not require program applicants and donees to certify that they are not debarred, suspended or otherwise excluded from receiving property or participating in any Federal program. Budget and Control Board and SSPO personnel revealed that they were not aware of this requirement.

41 CFR 102-37.390(d) states "To qualify for donation program eligibility through a SASP, an applicant must certify that it is not debarred, suspended, or excluded from any Federal program, including procurement programs."

41 CFR 102-37.445(e) states "Prior to a SASP releasing property to a donee, the donee must certify that it isn't currently debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or otherwise excluded from receiving the property."

We have reviewed the General Services Administration Excluded Parties List System (EPLS) and confirmed that no property was released by the SSPO to an excluded party.

We recommend that the Board develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that required exclusion, suspension and debarment certifications are obtained from program applicants and donees in compliance with Federal requirements.

We determined that the SPPO does not recertify applicant/donee eligibility in accordance with program regulations.

41 CFR 102-37.405 states, "You must update donee eligibility records as needed, but no less than every 3 years, to ensure that all documentation supporting the donee's eligibility is current and accurate. Annually, you must update files for nonprofit organizations whose eligibility depends on annual appropriations, annual licensing, or annual certification. Particular care must be taken to ensure that all records relating to the authority of donee representatives to receive and receipt for property, or to screen property at Federal facilities are current."

Without recertification of eligibility the Board is at risk of transferring property to someone who is ineligible to participate in the program. Of the 26 transactions tested we found that 10 donee files did not have current eligibility certifications. The total value of donated assets was \$9,028.

We recommend that the Board develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that applicant/donee recertifications are obtained and placed in the applicant/donee file in accordance with Federal regulations.

OMB Circular A-133 states "Non-federal entities are prohibited from contracting with or making subawards under covered transactions to parties that are suspended or debarred. Under nonprocurement suspension and debarment rules effective November 26, 2003 "covered transactions" include those procurement contracts for goods and services awarded under a nonprocurement transaction (e.g., grant or cooperative agreement) that are expected to equal or exceed \$25,000 or meet certain other specified criteria ... All nonprocurement transactions (i.e., subawards to subrecipients) irrespective of award amount are considered covered transactions.

We recommend the Department develop and implement written policies and procedures to document its compliance with Federal suspension and debarment requirements. Further the Department should ensure that all contracts funded solely or in part by Federal funds are with vendors who are not suspended or debarred.

Two of the five schools tested were identified to receive funds under State Grants for Innovative Programs but no funds were allocated to these two schools. Two of the five schools tested received funds under the Special Education Cluster, but there was no documentation regarding how the amount to be funded was determined. Since there was no documentation we could not determine if the schools received equitable funding.

Section 5206 of Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), 34 CFR sections 76.785 through 76.799 and OMB Circular A-133 require that new charter schools receive the amount of Federal formula funds for which they are eligible in a timely manner.

We recommend that the Department develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that new charter schools are properly identified and funded. The Department should more closely monitor the school districts to ensure that new charter schools are properly identified and funded.

Subpart C, Section .300(b) of OMB Circular A-133 requires that the auditee "maintain internal control over Federal programs that provide reasonable assurance that the auditee is managing Federal awards in compliance with laws, regulations, and the provisions of contracts or grant agreements that could have a material effect on each of its Federal programs."

We recommend the Department develop and implement formal procedures to ensure the accurate completion and independent review and approval of the SF-269 report. The review should be performed by an individual that is familiar with both the reporting requirements and accounting information that is reported therein.

We tested the Department's compliance with the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement for Federal Funding Period July 1, 2004 to September 30, 2005 and determined that the Department fell short of the MOE requirement by \$51,307. We determined that the Department only included enough State funds to meet the matching requirement, even though they had spent more in State funds. If the Department had included all allowable non-federal expenditures the MOE would have been met.

We recommend that the Department submit revised reports with the actual state funds applicable to this program. We also recommend that the Department identify requirements applicable to this grant and develop and implement procedures to ensure accurate reporting of information to the federal grantor. The procedures should require an independent review to ensure timely detection and correction of errors.

We performed auditing procedures on the South Carolina State Agency of Vocational Rehabilitation's (the Agency) final SF-269 report for grant number H126A050060. The report covered all activity through December 31, 2006. Based on our procedures we noted the following:

1. The Agency reported current year refunds totaling \$25,105 in box 10b of the SF-269 report. We were unable to agree the amount to the Agency's general ledger and the Agency could not document how it arrived at the reported amount.
2. The Agency reported an expenditure in box 10r twice. This resulted in an overstatement of \$1,488.
3. The Agency understated program (workshop) revenue in box 10r. The Agency reported that it transferred \$1,018,906, however it transferred \$1,020,140.
4. The Agency was unable to document the amount reported in box 10r for "Production Coordinators" expenditures. The Agency reported that it expended \$934,083. We were only able to document \$706,137 in expenditures.

5. The Agency did not properly report prior year refunds in accordance with the RSA-TAC-01-01 requirements. The Agency reported reductions totaling \$33,792 in box 10b and reductions totaling \$9,191 (\$7,285 - project/phase code 1209-50, and \$1,906 - project/phase code 1200-50) in box 10r.

U.S. Department of Education Technical Assistance Circular RSA-TAC-01-01 states, in part, "RSA uses the SF-269's to monitor the financial status of the program and to assess the compliance with the fiscal requirements contained in the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended. Therefore, reports must be accurate..." In addition the Technical Assistance Circular specifies, "refunds should be reported for the grant under which the expenditures were claimed."

We recommend the Agency develop and implement procedures to ensure that the SF-269 report is accurate and complete. The Agency should ensure that the SF-269 is independently reviewed by someone familiar with the contents of the report. The report should be reviewed to ensure that reported amounts are properly classified, accurate and agree to supporting documentation. In addition, we recommend that the Agency implement procedures to ensure that it accounts for refunds in accordance with program requirements.

1. The Agency could not support the amount reported as construction expenditures on Schedule I, line 3b. The Agency improperly included capital improvement expenditures of \$534,092 on Schedule I, line 3b.
2. The Agency overstated the FICA expenditures reported on Schedule I, lines 2A2a and 2A2b and Schedule II, line 4d for the "Job Coaching" program. The schedule used by the Agency to calculate personnel service and fringe benefit expenditures applied the Medicare tax rate (1.45%) to the personnel service expenditure base twice.
3. The Agency understated the travel expenditures applicable to one "Job Coaching" employee by \$195.
4. The Agency overstated "Total Person Years" reported on Schedule III, line 5. The Agency reported 856.0 "Total Person Years" but could only provide documentation to support 719.6 "Total Person Years".
5. The Agency could not provide documentation to support the amount reported on Schedule I, line 5 related to the Innovation and Expansion program.

Pass-through entities must monitor cash draws by their subrecipients to ensure that subrecipients conform substantially to the same standards of timing and amounts as apply to the pass-through entity.

We recommend that the Agency comply with the requirements of the Cash Management Improvement Act.

As of that date "covered transactions" include those procurement contracts for goods and services awarded under a nonprocurement transaction (e.g., grant or cooperative agreement) that are expected to equal or exceed \$25,000 or meet certain other specified criteria . . . All nonprocurement transactions (i.e., subawards to subrecipients), irrespective of award amount, are considered covered transactions--this was the case before November 26, 2003, and was not changed by the revised rules. In addition, 42 CFR Part 76.100 states, in part, ". . . A person who is debarred or suspended shall be excluded from Federal financial and non-financial assistance and benefits under Federal programs and activities. Debarment or suspension of a participant in a program by one agency shall have governmentwide effect . . . "

The Department became aware of the owner's debarment prior to renegotiating an extension to the contract dated October 1, 2001, which was set to expire on September 30, 2006. The original contract was entered into prior to the owner's debarment. The Medicaid provider operates several nursing facilities in South Carolina and provides services to several hundred Medicaid recipients. The Department contacted the Office of Inspector General (OIG) and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in an attempt to resolve this issue before the provider's contract ended. The Department also attempted to resolve the issue with the Medicaid provider, however a resolution could not be worked out prior to the end of the contract period. Because the Department did not have sufficient nursing home beds available and could not displace the Medicaid patients it elected to extend the contract with the provider.

The owner of the nursing homes divested his ownership interest in the facilities during December 2006. However, Medicaid assistance payments in the amount of \$4,245,982 were made to the nursing facilities prior to his divestiture. The federal share of these payments was \$2,952,656.

We recommend that the Department develop and implement procedures to monitor the vendors identified on the EPLS and notify the appropriate Bureau Chiefs once a vendor has been identified. If practicable the Department should develop a computer program to match its list of vendors to the EPLS. In addition, the Department should immediately contact CMS and determine how to best resolve the issue of questioned costs.

borrowed funds from SCHIP to meet those obligations. The Department repaid SCHIP from MAP funds within the first week of the following quarter. The Department did not properly record the substance of this financial transaction. It treated the federal draw-down on the Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA) and the quarterly Federal Cash Transaction Report as Medicaid Assistance revenue. In addition, the Department inappropriately reported the expenditure of SCHIP funds in order to draw down available funds from SCHIP to meet the MAP obligations. Similar transactions occurred during the last week of the quarters ending December 31, 2006 and March 31, 2007.

The Department borrowed a total of \$26,260,434.

OMB Circular A-87, Attachment A, Section C. states in part, "Any cost allocable to a particular Federal award or cost objective under the principles provided for in this Circular may not be charged to other Federal awards to overcome fund deficiencies, to avoid restrictions imposed by law or terms of the Federal awards, or for other reasons..."

One of the basic conditions for State allotments and Federal payments as outlined in 42 CFR 457.606, is that Federal payments out of an allotment are based on State expenditures which are allowable under the approved State child health plan. Both program requirements as outlined in 42 CFR 457 and South Carolina's approved SCHIP State Plan limit the use of SCHIP to payment of health care services for eligible children and related administrative costs.

We determined that the Department is not establishing accounts receivables related to Medicaid provider overpayments identified during the audit of provider cost reports in a timely manner. Our test of the Medicaid receivables disclosed that two receivables were established over two years after the Department received the final audit report. In addition, we are aware of several other instances where the Department has failed to record accounts receivables for overpayments in accordance with its established policy.

Because the Department is not establishing accounts receivables in a timely manner, reimbursement to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) is delayed. In addition, the Department increases its risk that the Medicaid provider will default on its obligation by not establishing the receivable in a timely manner. Any delay increases the Department's liability for the repayment to CMS.

We recommend that the Department ensure compliance with its established procedures.

The Code of Federal Regulations (45 CFR 95.621) specifies that State agencies are responsible for the security of all automated data processing systems involved in the administration of U.S. Department of Health and Human Services programs, and includes the establishment of a security plan that outlines how software and data security will be maintained. This section further requires that State agencies conduct a review and evaluation of physical and data security operating procedures and personnel practices on a biennial basis.

The Department began the process to procure an ADP risk analysis and system security review during fiscal year 2007. However, the vendors who submitted proposals were not responsive to all of the Request for Proposal (RFP) requirements. A second RFP was issued in October of 2007. The Department hopes to have a vendor in place during the first part of calendar year 2008.

The Medicaid program is highly dependent on extensive and complex computer systems that include controls for ensuring the proper payment of Medicaid benefits. Without periodic risk analyses and biennial system security reviews, control deficiencies may occur and not be detected resulting in improper or unauthorized Medicaid payments.

During our review of the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control's (the Department) Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance, we found an entry which inappropriately transferred revenue from one grant to another. Upon further investigation, we noted that the total expenditures for grant 5SC700706 012 5SC700715 009, general ledger account K855/310025, did not agree with the final report submitted to the grantor.

Department personnel informed us that they transferred funds from the WIC rebate account to general ledger account K855 to cover allowable WIC expenditures (Rx formula expenditures) after the final grant report was submitted since they believed that the federal draws had not been made. The transfer was recorded as a credit to an expenditure account which was later reversed and credited

to a revenue account. After Department personnel realized that the final report for grant 5SC700706 012 5SC700715 009 had been submitted they processed a journal entry to post the transaction to grant 5SC700706 8 5SC700715 8, general ledger account K857/310027. Department personnel then contacted the USDA liaison to explain the error and explain how they recorded the transaction. The grantor liaison advised the Department to record the transaction in general ledger account K855/310025 since the transaction related to grant 5SC700706 012 5SC700715 009 expenditures. We were subsequently provided evidence documenting where the Department recorded the expense and the federal draw for K855 Rx formula expenditures of \$605,725 and K856 Rx formula expenditures \$39,131 in general ledger account K856/310026 for grant 5SC700706 8 5SC700715 8. In addition, the full amount of the WIC Food award was drawn for K855 and recorded as WIC Food. The total for WIC Food and Rx formulas is \$605,725 greater than the expenditures included in the final WIC report for K855.

The remaining variance between the K855 general ledger and the final report relates to a journal entry recorded by the Department to close out general ledger account K854/310024 for grant 5SC700706 018 5SC700715 012 in the amount of \$159,662 and \$1,374,676 which represents funds drawn in excess of the expenditures reported to the grantor.

Currently, the person who draws the federal dollars is not informed of the RX formula expenditures in a timely manner in order to include the amount in the federal draw. Also, Department personnel recorded accounting transactions after closing the grant without informing other responsible parties (i.e., personnel responsible for grant reporting, etc.). In addition, Department personnel are not reconciling Department accounting records to grant reports. This resulted in a \$2,140,069 discrepancy between the Department's accounting records and the final federal report for K855.

We recommend that the Department establish procedures to ensure that personnel responsible for accounting transactions and grant reporting maintain appropriate levels of communication. Prior to closing out federal grants, personnel responsible for submitting grant reports should notify accounting personnel to ensure that all accounting transactions have been captured. In addition, accounting personnel should notify grant reporting personnel if accounting transactions occur after the grant close-out to ensure that amended reports can be timely filed. We also recommend the Department reconcile the differences between the Department's general ledger and the final reports submitted to the grantor for general ledger account numbers K855/310025, K856/310026, and K857/310027 for grant numbers 5SC700706 004 5SC700715 004 and 5SC700706 8 5SC700715 8 and verify that the expenditures were properly reported to the grantor. Entries should be posted to adjust the general ledger to the reported amount or the report should be revised as necessary.

The South Carolina Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services (the Department) did not meet maintenance of effort requirements related to tuberculosis services for substance abusers in treatment during fiscal year 2007. The Department expended \$22,144 less than the base year requirement.

Title 45 CFR Part 96.127 (c) states, in part, "the State shall maintain expenditures of non-Federal amounts for such services at a level that is not less than an average of such expenditures maintained by the State for the 2-year period proceeding the first fiscal year for which the State receives such grant."

The Department has reported the spending deficiency to the grantor in the current Block Grant application. However, we recommend the Department notify the grantor of the deficiency in a separate letter and request specific guidance to resolve the deficiency.

We tested the South Carolina Department of Social Service's (the Department) fiscal year 2007 Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA) used to prepare the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (SEFA) and noted several errors:

1. Grant awards for different years are rolled into the current year phase code for each federal program rather than shown separately. Normal State practice requires agencies to establish a unique phase code for each federal grant award. As grant transactions are processed the transactions are charged to the unique phase code thereby enabling grant expenditures to be separately accounted for at a statewide level. The Department has not assigned phase codes to specific grants in its accounting system. Instead, the Department uses phase codes to record grant activity by federal fiscal year. The Department staff told us that staff size is insufficient to review expenditures at the transaction level for determining the appropriate phase code to charge. The Department analyzes expenditures at the end of the federal fiscal year and makes necessary adjustments to the federal financial reports. We tested the Department's compliance with the period of availability requirement for each of our major programs and found no discrepancies. However, because expenditures are not properly recorded by phase code, we could not report the Department's expenditures by grant award number on the SEFA.

2. The Department reported negative expenditures of \$50,226 for CFDA No. 16.589 and negative revenues of \$1,330 for CFDA No. 97.050. These amounts should have been reported as other additions and other deductions in order to properly close out these grants.
3. The beginning balance was understated \$1,307 and receipts overstated in the same amount for CFDA 93.563.
4. The Food Stamp Cluster (CFDA Nos. 10.551 and 10.561) revenues and expenditures were overstated on the SFFA by \$2,932,107.

All of the SFFA errors have been corrected for proper reporting in the SEFA except as noted in number one above.

We noted that the Department reviewed 171 institutions during federal fiscal year 2007 which is in excess of the number of institutions required to meet the 33.3 percentage threshold. Of the 24 centers and organizations, 13 were not reviewed during federal fiscal years ending September 30, 2004, 2005 or 2006. Section 454 (24) (B) of the Social Security Act (the Act), as amended, by the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996 (PRWORA), requires states to have an operational automated data processing and information retrieval system for child and spousal support. The system must be in place by October 1, 1997, and meet all the requirements of paragraph (16) of the Act. The Secretary of the U. S. Department of Health and Human Services (USDHHS) must approve the system.

The Department did not implement the automated data processing and information retrieval system as required by Section 454 (24) (B). As a result, the Department received a letter from the USDHHS Division of Administration for Children and Families (ACF), dated January 27, 1998, providing formal notice that ACF intends to "disapprove South Carolina's State IV-D plan." The letter states that the basis for this decision is "South Carolina's failure to submit a State plan amendment by December 31, 1997, certifying that it is operating an automated child support enforcement system that meets all the requirements enacted on or before the date of enactment of the Family Support Act in accordance with Section 454 (24) (A) of the Act, as amended by the PRWORA.

The Department and USDHHS have reached an agreement in which the Department pays penalties to USDHHS for their noncompliance. During state fiscal year 2007, the Department paid \$6.9 million in penalties pertaining to federal fiscal year 2006 and \$6.8 million in penalties pertaining to federal fiscal year 2007.

As noted in our prior year finding, the Department had issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for an automated child support enforcement system that has been approved by USDHHS and was in the process of evaluating proposals. Because an automated information and retrieval system has not been implemented, certain data necessary for proper completion of the OCSE34A financial report is not available. The Department used the best available data and estimates in completing the report but we could not attest to the accuracy of that data.

The South Carolina Department of Corrections (the Department) submits quarterly financial reports to the U.S. Department of Justice. The following discrepancies were reported in the fiscal year 2006 single audit report:

1. The current federal outlays, current match outlays, and total outlays reported on the second quarter state fiscal year 2006 SF-269 report did not reconcile to the amounts reported on the Department's Special 17 Detail Report. Current federal outlays were understated \$96,487 and current match outlays were overstated \$7,623 resulting in an understatement of \$89,224 for total outlays.
2. The Department reported an incorrect indirect cost rate type, indirect cost, and base which resulted in the incorrect calculation of indirect cost reported for the period and remitted to the State General fund. According to Department personnel, cumulative program expenditures were used as the base and the prior agreed upon indirect cost rate of 5.3 percent was used to calculate indirect cost instead of the current agreed upon rate of 4.3 percent. This has been done since the inception of the grant. We did not determine the cumulative misstatement of the Department's error; however, in fiscal year 2006 the Department charged \$17,639 of indirect costs to the grant.

3. There is no segregation of duties regarding the preparation, review and approval of reports; one employee performs all three steps.

We recommended that the Department implement policies and procedures to ensure that financial reports and supporting worksheets are properly prepared and reviewed by employees that are knowledgeable of applicable federal reporting requirements. We also recommended that the expenditures reported on the reports are accurate and supported by the Department's financial records. Further, we recommended that the Department submit revised reports to the federal grantor amending the errors described above.

During our fiscal year 2007 follow-up, we determined the Department revised its financial reporting policies and procedures. We also reviewed the SF-269 report for the period ending December 31, 2006 and noted that the Department correctly reported current federal outlays, current match outlays and total outlays. The Department is not properly using and reporting the correct indirect cost rate type and indirect cost base which results in an overstatement of indirect cost for the period. According to Department personnel, the indirect cost reported is the cumulative amount of indirect cost incurred by the Department for the entire grant period to date.

The Department has reported indirect cost this way since the inception of the grant and because the Federal grantor has not questioned this practice the Department sees no need to implement a change so close to the end of the grant period.

The Department has not improved controls over report preparation, review, and approval. One person is still responsible for all three functions. Department personnel stated that one person preparing, reviewing and approving the reports is more efficient than having multiple employees involved in the process.

9. The Department's SFFA was not signed and dated by the preparer and reviewer.

Department personnel explained that some of the errors occurred because they did not fully understand the instructions for completing the SFFA. In addition, there apparently was some misunderstanding about which CFDA number to use for some of the CAs and the need to separately report the financial activities related to some CAs. All of the above identified discrepancies, with the exception of item 7, were adjusted on the Department's SFFA.

We recommend that the Department ensure that the information reported on the SFFA is accurate, complete, supported by the Department's accounting records, reconciles to the Comptroller General's accounting records, and is signed and dated by the preparer and reviewer. The Department is required to prepare both financial and performance reports for the Fish and Wildlife Cluster (CFDA Nos. 15.605 and 15.611) and the Cooperating Technical Partners (CTP) program (CFDA No. 97.045). During our review of a sample of the reports prepared during fiscal year 2007 we noted the following:

1. We were unable to agree match expenditures reported on certain SF-269 and FEMA 20-10 reports to the Department's subsidiary ledger because the Department reported estimates of fringe benefit expenditures instead of actual expenditures.
2. We were unable to agree indirect cost reported on one FEMA 20-10 report to the Department's subsidiary ledger because the Department reported it on an accrual basis of accounting instead of the cash basis. We were also unable to agree the federal share of indirect cost reported on two SF-269 reports to the Department's subsidiary ledger.

07P24-3. Reporting (Continued)

3. The Department reported the incorrect indirect cost rate on some SF-269 and FEMA 20-10 reports. According to Department personnel, these errors were made because of a misunderstanding regarding which indirect cost rate was supposed to be used for a particular year. We also noted instances of this during our analytical review of indirect cost.
4. We were unable to agree the indirect cost base reported on two SF-269 reports to supporting documentation.
5. For some SF-269, FEMA 20-10 and PSC-272 reports, the Department did not document its independent review of the reports. Department personnel indicated that they were unaware this process should be documented.

The templates for the FEMA Form 20-10 and SF-269 reports include instructions regarding the preparation of the reports. Further, the Department's approved indirect cost plan for fiscal year 2007 states that the indirect cost rate should be adjusted for each year in compliance with the indirect cost plan. Also, an effective system of internal controls requires an independent review be performed to ensure accuracy of computations of reported amounts and ensure the timely detection and correction of errors.

CFDA Nos.: 12.400 and 12.401

Condition: The Office of the Adjutant General (the Agency) had various findings related to its construction match transactions.

Recommendation: The Agency should resolve all matters relating to the Pickens, Ware Shoals, and Fountain Inn armories. The Agency should also establish policies and procedures to ensure that all construction funds are expended and accounted for in accordance with both Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. The Agency should also implement an adequate review of matching activities to assess the accuracy of the transactions.

Current Status: The Agency utilized State funds and made the necessary correcting entries to resolve the construction match issues related to the Pickens, Ware Shoals, and Fountain Inn armories. It was also determined during testing of the Military Construction Program that the Agency has implemented procedures to ensure that the construction funds are expended and accounted for in accordance with Federal and State requirements and that transactions are properly matched between Federal and State funds. Recommendation: We recommend that the Commission ensure that personnel preparing the SFFA and personnel reviewing the accuracy and completeness of the SFFA gain a thorough understanding of the Office of the State Auditor Letter of Instruction.

06E28-2. Matching Requirement

CFDA No.: 90.401

Condition: During our fiscal year 2006 follow up, we noted that the Commission corrected the under match in fiscal year 2005 and moved \$258,922 of federal expenditures paid in fiscal year 2006 to its match account. A report prepared by the U.S. Election Assistance Commission - Office of the Inspector General (OIG) dated September 13, 2006 disclosed the Commission had incorrectly determined the match requirement in fiscal year 2005 and still had an under match of \$85,319. The Commission originally calculated the State match by multiplying five percent by the \$32,421,280 total grant funds which resulted in a state match of \$1,621,064. The correct calculation should have been to divide the total grant amount by 95 percent and then subtract the grant award from that total which would result in a match of \$1,706,383. The Inspector General's Office further noted that the Commission did not deposit the amount it had appropriated for the match into the State Election Fund to earn interest, which resulted in an estimated \$29,475 of lost interest.

Recommendation: We recommend, in accordance with the OIG recommendation, that the State Election Commission deposit State funds of \$114,794 (\$85,319 under match plus interest of \$29,475) into the State Election Fund restricted account.

Condition: The Commission submitted an amended 2004 SF-269 report to the federal grantor for Title I, Section 101 and 102 funds (CFDA No. 39.011); however, amounts reported for calendar year interest did not agree to supporting documentation. The Commission did not submit an amended 2004 SF-269 report for Title II (CFDA No. 90.401), or contact the federal grantor regarding reporting requirements to ensure reports were prepared in accordance with federal guidelines or develop policies and procedures regarding reporting as recommended.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Commission submit revised reports correcting the errors described above. In addition, we recommend that the Commission meet with the federal grantor to identify the reporting requirements applicable to its federal grants and develop and implement procedures to ensure accurate reporting of information to the federal grantor. The procedures should identify specific steps to be followed by the preparer and require an independent review to ensure the timely detection and correction of errors.

Current Status: The Commission contacted the federal grantor regarding its reporting issues; however, the Commission has elected not to submit amended reports until the issues are completely resolved. This finding is repeated on Schedule 3 at **07E28-3. Reporting.**

 - (a) Total indirect expense reported at line 11.d. was understated by \$507.
 - (b) The prior year refunds for 5002-120040 were overstated by \$598.
 - (c) A line item on the Agency's supporting spreadsheet labeled "Total Expenditures for fiscal year 2004 per Account History" was understated by \$6,863.
 - (d) The program income for SSI Reimbursements for 5002-120940 was understated by \$28. Expenditures from 5002-120940 were overstated by \$293.
 - (e) The miscellaneous income included on the fiscal year 2004 Program Income and Expenditure schedule contained a formula error. The total excludes 3914-120040 miscellaneous income of \$17,637.
- (2) We noted that the Agency-reported amounts for expenditures of prior year refunds, miscellaneous income, and surplus sales, which are included in program income, did not agree to the accounting records. The expenditure amount was adjusted to equal revenue with the exception of general ledger account 5002-120040 which reported a component of Prior Year Refunds and Miscellaneous totaling \$22,095 as "disbursed program income" (Line 10r).

06H73-2. Subrecipient Cash Management

CFDA Nos.: 84.169 and 84.235

Condition: The Agency has not developed and implemented procedures to ensure that funds advanced to subrecipients comply with federal regulations applicable to the Cash Management Improvement Act. In addition, the Agency has not developed and implemented procedures to monitor its subrecipients' compliance with grant award requirements.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Agency comply with the Cash Management Improvement Act or obtain Federal approval to advance funds to subrecipients based on the previous months' expenditures.

Current Status: Based on our review, the Agency now transmits funds to the South Carolina Department of Education on a reimbursement basis only for CFDA No. 84.235. However, for CFDA No. 84.169, the Agency advanced funds to the Independent Living Council based on the subrecipient's projected expenditures during fiscal year 2007. The Agency did not have procedures in place to monitor the subrecipient's compliance with the Cash Management Improvement Act and had not obtained written Federal approval to advance funds to subrecipients based on the previous months' expenditures. Therefore, this finding is repeated for CFDA No. 84.169 on Schedule 3 at **07H73-3. Subrecipient Cash Management.**

Current Status: We performed a test of disbursements for fiscal year 2007 and no unallowable costs were noted. This finding will not be repeated.

06H73-4. Time Sheets

CFDA No.: 84.126

Condition: Our test of payroll revealed that an hourly employee's time sheet was not signed and dated by his supervisor. It was also noted that the hours worked documented on the October 28, 2005 time sheet (2 hours) did not trace and agree to the hours worked posted to the Agency's payroll administration system (4 hours).

Recommendation: We recommend that the Agency strengthen its procedure of ensuring original time sheets are not entered into the payroll administration system until it has been verified and approved by an employee's immediate supervisor.

Current Status: We performed a test of payroll for fiscal year 2007 and determined that an hourly employee did not sign and date her time sheet and another hourly employee's time sheet was not signed and dated by his supervisor. However, we did not note any instances where hours reported on employees' time sheets did not agree to the hours posted to the Agency's payroll administration system. As a result, we downgraded the portion of this finding related to the lack of signatures to a control deficiency and discussed it with the Agency's management. This finding will not be repeated.

Current Status: The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration requested that the \$147,469 be returned and the Department returned the funds in September 2007. The Department is currently appealing the decision. This finding will not be repeated.

Condition: Since the Department can not substantiate the personal services allocations, we can not determine if non-payroll disbursement allocations are appropriate.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that the method of allocating personal service is verifiable in order to ensure operating costs are properly allocated. This can be done through timesheets, surveys, or another method of documentation that is verifiable. We also recommend that the personnel responsible for the allocation of operating costs perform a careful review of supporting documentation.

Current Status: The Department has taken adequate corrective action. The use of time sheets has been implemented to ensure the method of allocating costs can be verified. This finding will not be repeated.

The South Carolina Department of Public Safety's (the Department) policy requires subrecipients to submit an A-133 audit or a letter stating that an A-133 audit was not necessary. If neither is received, the Department contacts the subrecipient to request the information. This policy provides assurance that all subrecipients are in compliance with OMB Circular A-133 requirements. Five of the fifteen subrecipients tested had not submitted documentation to show compliance with A-133 requirements. Our test results showed that neither a report nor a letter had been received from those five subrecipients ten months after the due date. The Department did not notify subrecipients of their noncompliance or to request information as the Department's policy requires.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department follow procedures to ensure that reports or letters not received from subrecipients are followed up in a timely manner.

Current Status: The Department has not corrected the audit finding. This finding is repeated on Schedule 3 at **07K05-1. Subrecipient Monitoring.**

06K05-2. Indirect Cost

CFDA No.: 16.710

Condition: For fiscal year ended June 30, 2005 the Department charged indirect costs in the amount of \$39,913 to the Public Safety Partnership and Community Policing Grant. The Universal Hiring Program Grant Manual, Section IX states, "indirect costs are not allowable costs".

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department refund the Federal Grantor all indirect costs charged to the program.

Condition: During the fiscal year 2006 audit, we noted two of six procurement contracts tested did not include a clause regarding suspension and did not include certification by the contractor that they were not suspended or debarred. Also, the Department did not verify that vendors were not listed on the Excluded Parties List System (EPLS). Further, we noted the Department does not have formal written policies and procedures regarding suspension and debarment and the procurement officers are not fully aware of suspension and debarment requirements.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department develop and implement written policies and procedures to document its compliance with Federal suspension and debarment requirements. Further the Department should ensure that all contracts funded solely or in part by Federal funds are with vendors who are not suspended or debarred.

Current Status: The Department has implemented revised policies and procedures to document its compliance with Federal suspension and debarment requirements and to ensure that all contracts funded solely or in part by Federal funds are with vendors who are not suspended or debarred. This finding will not be repeated.

Condition: The Department is required to submit quarterly financial reports to the U.S. Department of Justice. Based on our review of the reports submitted during fiscal year 2006, we found the following:

- (1) The current federal outlays, current match outlays, and total outlays reported on the second quarter state fiscal year 2006 SF-269 report did not reconcile to the amounts reported on the Department's Special 17 Detail Report. Current federal outlays were understated \$96,847 and current match outlays were overstated \$7,623 resulting in an understatement of \$89,224 for total outlays.
- (2) The Department reported an incorrect indirect cost rate type, indirect cost rate, and base which resulted in the incorrect calculation of indirect cost reported for the period and remitted to the State General Fund. We did not determine the cumulative misstatement of the Department's error; however in fiscal year 2006 the Department charged \$17,639 of indirect costs to the grant.
- (3) There is no segregation of duties regarding the preparation, review and approval of reports; one employee performs all three steps.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department implement policies and procedures to ensure that financial reports and supporting worksheets are properly prepared and reviewed by employees that are knowledgeable of applicable federal requirements. We also recommend that the expenditures reported on the reports are accurate and supported by the Department's financial records. Further, we recommend the Department submit revised reports to the federal grantor amending the errors described above.

Current Status: The Department revised its policies and procedures regarding financial reporting; however, they did not change the policy of one employee preparing, reviewing and approving reports. Also, we reviewed the SF-269 report for the period ending December 31, 2006 and noted the Department properly reported total federal and total current outlays; however, they failed to properly report indirect cost rate, rate type and base resulting in the incorrect calculation of indirect cost reported for the period. Further, the Department did not submit revised reports to the federal grantor amending the errors described in the prior finding. This finding is repeated on Schedule 3 at **07N04-1. Financial Reporting.**

06N04-5. Matching Requirement

CFDA No.: 16.586

Condition: During our testing of the Department's compliance with the matching requirement for the Violent Offender Incarceration and Truth in Sentencing Incentive Formula Grants (VOITIS) we determined that the Department did not meet the projected match of 10 percent of total project costs for one of seven construction projects that were closed during fiscal year 2006. The required match for this project was \$41,153; however, the Department paid only \$11,514 of this required amount with appropriate matching funds.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department strengthen its policies and procedures for monitoring compliance with matching requirements. We further recommend the Department correct the under match for this project.

Current Status: We determined that the Department reopened the project and corrected the under match of \$29,639. This finding will not be repeated.

Current Status: The Commission has developed formal written policies and procedures regarding monitoring of subrecipients who expend \$500,000 or more in Federal funds. This finding will not be repeated.

06P24-1. Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA)

CFDA Nos.: All

Condition: During our review of the fiscal year 2006 Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA), we noted the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources (the Department) did not complete the SFFA as required.

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department establish written policies and procedures to ensure that the instructions issued by the Office of the State Auditor for preparation of the SFFA and other requested information are properly implemented and documented. The Department should establish review procedures to detect and correct errors and omissions before submission to the Office of the State Auditor. The procedures used should be consistently applied each year.

Current Status: During our review of the fiscal year 2007 SFFA we noted similar exceptions. This finding is repeated on Schedule 3 at **07P24-1. Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance.**

Current Status: During our fiscal year 2007 follow-up, we noted that the Department has implemented policies and procedures over the monitoring of subrecipients. This finding will not be repeated.

We have completed our review of the report resulting from the follow up audit on the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs for the year ended June 30, 2007. Our response to the findings is as follows:

07E28-1. Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance

On the Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA) the following errors were noted.

- 1) Receipts and expenditures were overstated by \$91,157. In calculating the expenditures and revenues, we used figures from our agency accounting system and included items that were internal corrections instead of reconciling using reports from the Comptroller General (CG). The total amount of federal assistance was not affected by the error. This error has been corrected.
- 2) Other additions and deductions were understated by \$6,688. This error occurred in FY 2004-05 when an invoice for \$7,059.69 was processed and the amount of state matching and federal funds were reversed. This caused an error in both federal and matching funds in the amount of \$6,688.13 (the difference in the two amounts). When preparing the 2006 SFFA, this error was reported; however, it was not listed in the "other additions/other deductions" columns. This error has been corrected.

07E28-2. Matching Requirement

As reported by the State Auditor's Office, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) advised us that we had miscalculated the state's matching portion of the grant and the funds should have been deposited into the interest-bearing "election fund". The STO and OIG disagree as to what constitutes the "election fund". We will continue to work with the STO to resolve this issue.

In order to properly account for interest, the State Treasurer's Office (STO) will provide monthly interest rates. Since interest rates are currently unknown, we have devised a formula for calculating the interest based on the lump sum provided to us by the STO on a monthly basis.

Since the State Auditor's report on the findings, we met with the STO to transfer the difference in matching funds and interest lost. The Budget Office advised us on the procedure to move the above-referenced funds and the transfer was completed on January 3, 2008.

07E28-3 Reporting

Your report states that the SEC amended the 269 reports for fiscal year 2004 for Sections 101 and 102, but did not provide documentation supporting amounts reported as calendar years 2003 and 2004 interest. This information was provided on a spreadsheet at the back of the folder with the completed 269 forms.

Your report states we did not attempt to contact the federal grantor regarding reporting requirements to ensure reports were prepared in accordance with federal guidelines. Between November 2006 and March 2007, the Election Assistance Commission was contacted on numerous occasions to obtain clarification. We received a response on March 26, 2007 directing us to use the actual monthly interest rates when calculating the lost interest. Once interest rates are obtained from the STO, amended 269 Reports will be submitted.

As always, the SEC makes every effort to comply with State and Federal guidelines.

The South Carolina State Budget & Control Board has prepared the following responses to the findings of the audit for the Donation of Federal Surplus Personal Property Program, CFDA# 39.003, for the year ended June 30, 2007.

07F03-1. Suspension and Debarment

Recommendation:

We recommend that the Board develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that required exclusion, suspension and debarment certifications are obtained from program applicants and donees in compliance with Federal requirements.

Response:

Surplus Property will revise both the donee application and property issue document to include the donee's certification that would indicate that the donee has not been debarred, suspended or excluded from participation in federal programs.

In addition, when processing a donee's application and subsequent recertifications Surplus Property will check the applicant and its principals against the Excluded Parties List System.

07F03-2. Eligibility

Recommendation:

We recommend that the Board develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that the applicant/donee recertifications are obtained and placed in the applicant/donee file in accordance with Federal regulations.

Response:

Our goal is to distribute federal surplus personal property to donees that are in need of the items in the most expedient way. We were aware of this problem and have made significant efforts to update these files. In May 2006, we performed a mass mailing for updates for all files and the updating process started within 10 days of that mailing using the GSA approved checklist. For those that were returned, the file updates were completed by August 2007. For those donees that did not respond, we again notified them by mail regarding the required file updates. In October 2007, we implemented GSA's recommendation to defer donees that had not responded. All unresponsive donees were put in deferred status. In December, employees were notified to check the status of donees prior to property being issued. As of this date, all files have been updated.

07F03-3. Subrecipient Monitoring

Recommendation:

We recommend that the Board develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that subrecipients receiving \$500,000 or more in federal personal property in a fiscal year have an OMB Circular A-133 audit performed in accordance with Federal regulations.

Response:

Surplus Property will review the amounts distributed to the various donees at year end. For any donee that received \$500,000 (actual amount of 2,145,923 x 23.3%) or more in federal property in a fiscal year, we will request a copy of the required A-133 audit. If we do not get a copy after nine months of the donee's fiscal year end, we will send a second letter stating the A-133 audit requirement and request a copy for our records. We will also include this requirement on our donee application form and recertification form. For FY2007 there was only one donee that qualified. This donee issued its audit report which was not an A-133 audit in December 2007. Surplus Property will now notify donees that are required to have an A-133 audit immediately after fiscal year end.

07F03-4. Reporting

Recommendation:

We recommend that the Board develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that all information included on reports and schedules submitted to Federal and State agencies are reconciled to agency accounting records and are independently reviewed for completeness and accuracy.

Response:

Beginning January 2008, Surplus Property started compiling a separate report on a quarterly basis that will include all invoice receipts processed during the quarter. After the data is pulled from our system for inclusion on the quarterly GSA 3040 reports, the data will be reconciled to this separate report. Of the amount reported as having been received by Surplus Property in FY2007, the audited variance was only \$31,833 or .28%.

There were four reportable conditions and we will address each one as they were presented to us.

We tested seven contracts to determine if the Department was complying with the suspension and debarment compliance requirement. We were unable to verify that the Department had reviewed the Excluded Parties List System (EPLS). There was no documentation showing the Department had verified that vendors were not listed on the EPLS. We noted the Department does not have formal written policies and procedures regarding verification of the EPLS. This could result in the Department contracting with a vendor who is suspended or debarred.

We recommend the Department develop and implement written policies and procedures to document its compliance with Federal suspension and debarment requirements. Further the Department should ensure that all contracts funded solely or in part by Federal funds are with vendors who are not suspended or debarred.

Response:

We concur with this finding and the Office of Procurement and Administrative Services will make every effort to comply with the findings of the auditors as they apply to suspension and debarment of vendors. The Office of Procurement and Services currently has a debarment clause in the boiler plate of all contracts established by the Department. Vendors on requests utilizing federal funds that exceed the \$25,000 specified criteria will be verified for compliance using the EPLS, and a copy of this verification will be attached to the request.

The auditors recommended that the Department develop and implement written policies and procedures to document its compliance with federal suspension and debarment requirements. The Department's procurement manual already has written policies and procedures (see attached). As stated above, the Office of Procurement and Services will take steps to ensure that this policy is followed. This information is omitted from our procurement guidelines which were developed to assist offices with their day-to-day purchases.

We tested all of the new Charter Schools within South Carolina for the 06-07 school year (5). 2 of the 5 schools tested were identified to receive funds under State Grants for Innovative Programs but no funds were allocated to these two schools. 2 of the 5 schools tested received funds under the Special Education Cluster, but there was no documentation regarding how the amount to be funded was determined. Since there was no documentation we could not determine if the schools received equitable funding.

We recommend that the Department develop and implement policies and procedures to ensure that new charter schools be properly identified and funded. The Department should more closely monitor the School Districts to ensure that new charter schools are properly identified and funded.

Response:

The Department has made great progress in making sure that charter schools are aware of funding or services to which they are entitled. The Office of Finance has developed a matrix outlining the eligibility criteria for all K-12 funding (both state and federal) for which a charter school may be eligible. This information has been shared with charter schools and school districts and can be found on the Department's Web site under the Office of Finance. The Office of Finance has also requested data from the school districts for current year payments from July 1, 2007, through December 31, 2007, made to charter schools to include base funding as well as categorical funding. We believe that in several of the cases cited above, funds/services were provided to the charter schools in question, but adequate documentation did not exist as proof.

With regards to the State Grants for Innovative Programs (Title V), the Department did not have a formal procedure in place for the 2006-07 school year to ensure that eligible charter schools received an equitable portion of Title V funds. If Title V funds become available in the future, the Department will add a requirement to the Title V application requiring districts to allocate a per-pupil allocation to charter schools as is currently required for private schools.

With regards to the Special Education Cluster, districts will be required to document in their application funds that will be spent on behalf of all eligible charters.

We selected the final 9/30/06 closeout SF-269 report of the 2004 grant for our test work and determined that the supporting documentation did not agree to the reported amounts. Total outlays for the Programs of Instruction (0-8) & (9-12) and State Leadership could not be traced to supporting documentation.

We recommend the Department develop and implement formal procedures for the completion, independent review and approval of the SF-269 report. The review should be performed by an individual that is familiar with both the reporting requirements and accounting information that is reported within.

Response:

While we concur that there was a problem in tracing this report to supporting documentation, setting up an account structure for this particular grant to coincide with the complex SF-269 report has always been a challenge. We would note that the process for completing this SF-269 and the supporting documentation have been the same for many years and were tested on more than one occasion by the State Auditor's Office and federal auditors from the U.S. Department of Education without any findings in the manner in which our data was reported. However, in FY 07-08 the Office of Finance changed the process for preparing this report and has made sure that accounts are set up in such a manner that will allow for supporting documentation to exist in the proper categories. The interim report for the 2005 grant was reviewed by the State Auditor's Office during the current audit and found to be acceptable.

07H63-4. Maintenance of Effort

Vocational Education - Basis Grants to States

CFDA No.: 84.048

Grant No.: VO48A040040

A-133 Compliance Supplement states that "A state must maintain its fiscal effort in the preceding year from State sources for vocational and technical education on either an aggregate or a per-student basis when compared with such effort in the second preceding year, unless this requirement is specifically waived by the Secretary of Education."

We tested the Department's compliance with the MOE requirement for Federal Funding Period 7/01/2004 - 9/30/2005 and determined that based on the final Status of Funds report the Department fell short of the MOE requirement by \$51,307. We determined that the Department only included enough State Funds to meet the matching requirement, even though they had spent more in State Funds. If the State Agency had included all allowable non-federal expenditures the MOE would have been met.


We recommend that the Department submit revised reports with the actual state funds applicable to this program. We also recommend that the Department identify requirements applicable to this grant and develop and implement procedures to ensure accurate reporting of information to the federal grantor. The procedures should require an independent review to ensure timely detection and correction of errors.

Response:

We concur with the finding, and revised reports have been submitted and accepted by the U.S. Department of Education. The error in the report was the result of a misinterpretation of the requirement by the individual completing the report. Clarification has been provided, and the error should not occur again in future reports.

071173-1. Reporting – SF-269 – We recommend the agency develop and implement procedures to ensure that the SF-269 report is accurate and complete. The Agency should ensure that the SF-269 is independently reviewed by someone familiar with the contents of the report. The report should be reviewed to ensure that reported amounts are properly classified, accurate and agree to supporting documentation. In addition, we recommend that the Agency implement procedures to ensure that it accounts for refunds in accordance with program requirements.

Response:

We have strengthened our procedures to ensure the accuracy and proper documentation of the SF-269. Following are our responses to specific items noted within the finding.

1. Our financial system does not separate current year refunds from daily voucher activities, and only the net totals are presented in the account history reports (general ledger). A request has been submitted to the IT Department to amend the system to allow for capturing current refunds as separate line items in the account history.

2-4. We concur with the recommendations. The review process will be strengthened to ensure that back-up documentation adequately supports figures in the SF-269, and that items are properly classified in this report.

5. Regarding matching prior year refunds to the appropriate grant year, we are requesting clarification from our federal RSA contact about the proper way to handle these refunds. Most prior year refunds apply to a grant year that has already been closed, and re-opening a closed grant year may not be the most appropriate way to handle these refunds.

071173-2. Reporting – RSA-2 – We recommend the Agency develop and implement procedures to ensure that the RSA-2 report is accurate and complete. The Agency should ensure that the RSA-2 is independently reviewed by someone familiar with the contents of the report. The report should be reviewed to ensure the reported amounts are properly classified, accurate and agree to supporting documentation.

Response: We concur with the recommendation. We will review and implement procedures to ensure all figures reported are accurate, properly classified and adequately supported.

071173-3. Sub-recipient Cash Management – We recommend that the State Agency comply with the Cash Management Improvement Act.

Response: Over the past several months, we have had teleconferences with our federal RSA contacts regarding the unique relationships between SCVRD, (as the Designated State Unit), SILC, (the State Independent Living Council) and the Part B Centers for Independent Living. As a result, our current understanding of the regulations is that there is no subrecipient relationship with the SILC or with the Part B Centers. We are continuing to work with our RSA contacts to set guidelines and responsibilities of the various parties to monitor and manage the Independent Living Grant. We have asked the RSA for a waiver to the requirements of the Cash Management Act because of the distinctive requirements of this grant.

We have reviewed the audit findings for the Fiscal Year 2007 Statewide Single Audit for the South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), and offer the following response for your consideration.

Financial Accounting and Reporting

Recommendations: The Department develop and implement appropriate internal control procedures to ensure that all events and transactions necessary to comply with federal reporting requirements and laws, regulations and other compliance requirements are properly and timely recorded in the Department accounting records and properly reported on federal reports. We also recommend that the Department develop and implement procedures to ensure that funds from one Federal program are not used to overcome fund deficiencies of another Federal awards program.

Response: DHHS agrees with the finding and recommendation, and will discontinue the practice of borrowing funds from SCHIP to supplement month end shortfalls in Medicaid funds. Any Medicaid shortfalls will be addressed by requesting supplemental awards from CMS through the required procedures. The Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance (SFFA) will be adjusted to reflect a grant transfer between SCHIP and Medicaid for the SFY ending June 30, 2007 to reflect the proper reporting of the funds. DHHS reimbursed the SCHIP account \$26,260,434 for funds borrowed on June 29, 2007 on July 5, 2007 in conjunction with our normal draw process. With the discontinuance of this practice, DHHS will not encounter the aforementioned issues in the future.

Suspension and Debarment

Recommendation: DHHS should develop and implement procedures to monitor the vendors identified on the EPLS and notify the appropriate Bureau Chiefs once a vendor has been identified. If practicable the Department should develop a computer program to match its list of vendors to the EPLS. In addition, the Department should immediately contact CMS and determine how to best resolve the issue of questioned costs.

Response: DHHS will comply with this recommendation, although the decision to extend the nursing facility contracts was the only possible option given the following circumstances.

As indicated in the finding on Suspension and Debarment, DHHS was aware of this provider's status after the Statewide Single Audit in 2006. This debarment was the result of an action by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and concerned an owner/operator of seven nursing facilities. The SAO informally recommended that DHHS resolve the matter before the next audit period. Immediately upon receipt of this informal recommendation, DHHS began researching the federal regulations to determine our legal obligations, as well as the Suspension and Debarment process for requesting an exception from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, pursuant to 45 CFR 76, to allow DHHS to continue to contract with these nursing facilities to provide care to approximately 467 Medicaid beneficiaries. DHHS knew time was of the essence to resolve this matter, as the contracts with the nursing facilities were subject to renewal on October 1, 2006.

DHHS contacted at least 12 individuals including staff at the Office of Inspector General Office (OIG), HUD and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for guidance and clarification regarding how to resolve this issue. As late as September 28, 2006, DHHS had not received any definitive guidance from any of the federal agencies contacted as to what we needed to do to continue providing services to these beneficiaries. Therefore, DHHS had to make a decision: whether to temporarily extend the contracts with the provider or terminate the contracts, which would have forced the relocation of 467 frail, elderly Medicaid beneficiaries. In reality, moving these beneficiaries would have been impossible because there were insufficient nursing home beds available for this number of individuals. DHHS decided to temporarily extend the nursing home contracts with the provider to avoid disruption of services and potential harm to these beneficiaries' health and welfare until this matter could be resolved.

During the next three months, October 1, 2006, through December 31, 2006, DHHS, along with the provider's attorneys and CMS, worked diligently to arrive at a solution that would allow DHHS to continue to provide Medicaid services to these beneficiaries and still claim federal funding. The provider cooperated with DHHS and CMS and agreed to divest himself of all ownership and management control of the seven nursing facilities in question. DHHS and attorneys for the provider were in constant contact with CMS, and CMS was always aware of our actions and claims for federal funds during this period. For example, on December 8, 2006, DHHS wrote to Leslie Norwalk, Acting Administrator for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), asking what impact this provider's debarment would have on the Medicaid program and what immediate remedies needed to be taken to maintain continuity of care for all patients involved.

DHHS sees no reason for the SAO to question the federal Medicaid funds claimed during the three-month period when all parties were working toward the transfer of ownership of the nursing facilities. It is inconceivable that either the SAO or CMS would have wanted DHHS to respond by abruptly terminating its contracts with this provider and endangering 467 Medicaid beneficiaries. DHHS did comply with all available federal guidance and acted with full disclosure to CMS in arriving at a solution to this issue. However, DHHS will comply with the SAO's recommendation to again contact CMS.

The Department has already developed procedures to review the EPLS before contracts are entered into and renewed to ensure that Medicaid providers have not been suspended or debarred. It may not be feasible to automate this process; the individuals and/or entity's names listed in the EPLS may or may not be the same name used by a Medicaid provider. Plus, the EPLS does not

contain other identifying information such as federal tax identification numbers or social security numbers that would be necessary for an automated match. Finally, the EPLS database is not in a format that can be downloaded in its entirety and compared against Medicaid provider records.

Long Term Care Audit Receivables

Recommendation: DHHS should ensure compliance with its Long Term Care Reimbursement Division's policy which requires that a receivable be established within 30 days after the receipt of an audit report.

Response: DHHS agrees with the finding and recommendation, and has implemented the following procedures:

1. Effective January 1, 2008, the following additional information will be required on the State Auditor's Office Audit Report Log that is maintained by the Division of Long Term Care Reimbursement: Date Final Received, Due Date, Date Processed, Number of Days to Complete, and Explanation if Number of Days to Complete Exceeds 30 Days, and Explanation if Final Audit is Being Held for Further Review.
2. Effective January 1, 2008, on a monthly basis, a Division of Long Term Care staff member will be responsible for reviewing the SAO website www.osa.state.sc.us/medicaidreports and reconcile to the State Auditor's Office Audit Report Log. If a final audit report from the SAO has not been received but is listed on the SAO website, the SAO will be notified of the audit(s) not yet received via e-mail.
3. Effective January 1, 2008, on a monthly basis, the Division Director will review the State Auditor's Office Audit Report Log and verify that the appropriate adjustments have been processed within the specified time frames.

Automated Date Processing (APD) Risk Analysis and System Security Review

Recommendations: The Department should establish and maintain a program to ensure that periodic ADP risk analyses and biennial system security reviews are performed in accordance with federal requirements.

Response: DHHS agrees with the finding and recommendation. The Department released an ADP Risk Assessment RFP in October 2006. One response was received which did not meet the requirements of the RFP. The RFP was revised and released a second time to the State Procurement Material Management Office (MMO) in June 2007. A vendor is expected to be in place the first part of 2008.

We have reviewed the audit finding for the FY2007 Statewide Single Audit for the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control, and offer the following response for your consideration:

07J04-1. WIC Accounting and Reporting

Recommendation: We recommend that the Department establish procedures to ensure that personnel responsible for accounting transactions and grant reporting maintain appropriate levels of communication. Prior to closing out federal grants, personnel responsible for submitting grant reports should notify accounting personnel to ensure that all accounting transactions have been captured. In addition, accounting personnel should notify grant reporting personnel if accounting transactions occur after the grant close-out to ensure that amended reports can be timely filed. We also recommend the Department reconcile the differences between the Department's general ledger and the final reports submitted to the grantor for general ledger account numbers K855/310025, K856/310026, and K857/310027 for grant numbers 5SC700706 004 5SC700715 004 and 5SC700706 8 5SC700715 8 and verify that the expenditures were properly reported to the grantor. Entries should be posted to agree the general ledger to the reported amount o'the report should be revised as necessary.

Action Taken: The closeout will be coordinated between the Director of the Bureau of Financial Management (BFM) Division of Cost Accounting, Cash Management, and PCAS, and staff responsible for accounting transactions. Steps had already been put in place to lock down funds so that any transactions occurring after the closeout will require a written sign-off by the Director of Cost Accounting, Cash Management, and PCAS.

Expenditures on the reports mentioned are being reconciled to the books and adjusting entries are being made. According to USDA, it may be necessary to re-file the reports after the entries have been made. We made a request to USDA to use the carry forward from the current year to cover these legitimate WIC expenditures. We have been asked to submit a request in writing to re-open

reports from prior years and they will then make the request to headquarters as to whether we need to re-file the reports and return any unspent funds, if applicable. For last year's report, we may adjust the carry forward amount as needed in administrative dollars. Currently, K857 has not been closed, but we will be working on that closeout within the next week.

Written procedures will be updated to include the reconciliation process of the rebates and food draws as well as the administration costs to the actual reported amount on the WIC closeout report. The adjusting entries will be made as soon as all rebates have been received for the year being closed and totals will be verified at that time.


Maintenance of Effort

The State of South Carolina did not meet the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) requirement for providing tuberculosis (TB) services to substance abusers in treatment, as reported in the Fiscal Year 2008 (FY08) Block Grant Application. The State expended \$22,144 less than the base year requirement of \$24,118.

The S.C. Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services (DAODAS) requests a finding of material compliance with the, TB MOE requirement for the FY08 Block Grant. DAODAS does not allocate state funds for TB services. The S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC) is the state agency that reimburses local health departments for TB services. Therefore, while DAODAS relies on DHEC to ensure that TB clients in need of substance abuse treatment services are referred to local alcohol and other drug healthcare providers; DAODAS has no direct involvement in such referrals.

However, DAODAS and DHEC *do* collaborate to ensure that TB clients receive priority admissions and access to appropriate substance abuse treatment services. In fiscal year 2006, DHEC did not have many clients presenting with a substance abuse diagnosis, and as a result, fewer referrals were made. This *is* the reason for the decline in funds spent on substance-abusing TB clients, and DAODAS' subsequent failure to meet the MOE requirement. However, DAODAS is in material compliance by ensuring that TB clients in need of treatment services for substance abuse did receive such services.

07L04-1: Schedule of Federal Financial Assistance

Recommendation:

We recommend that the Department ensure that the SFFA is prepared and independently reviewed by staff that is knowledgeable of the requirements of the State Auditor's letter of instructions and federal reporting requirements. We further recommend that the SFFA include phase code information representing each federal grant award to which expenditures should be charged.

Action Taken:

The Department will ensure that the SFFA is prepared and independently reviewed by staff knowledgeable of the requirements of the State Auditor's letter of instructions and federal reporting requirements.

However, it is noted that the requirement to report by phase is a State requirement, not a Circular A-133 requirement. Currently, the Department's accounting system does not record expenditures with a 100% relationship between phase and grant number. Based on the requirements in administering 32 programs, most with multiple grant years open at any point in time, modifications to grant accounting in the current system would required extensive modifications to the accounting procedures.

A manual process of analyzing grant expenditures by phase would also be highly labor intensive. Considering the State intends to adopt a new statewide accounting system in July 2009, modifications to our accounting procedures are not under consideration. The new system should have a reporting module that will record revenue and expenditures by grant. To resolve this audit finding, the Department is relying on the new accounting system to ensure a fully automated SFFA that includes expenditure and revenue information by grant number.
